Nutritional Information

Nutrition and healthy living are about more than just what you eat and how often you work out. Sleep is a very important factor of wellness that many take for granted and abuse. It is easy to get in the habit of sleeping less to have more time in the day, but there is a growing amount of research showing a link between lack of sleep and obesity, type 2 diabetes, and heart disease. Sleep is important for metabolism and digestion and when this process is interrupted your health suffers. Sleep deprivation, which could be as simple as cutting your sleep time by an hour or two a night, also has a few ways of leading to a higher weight status. When you sleep less you are more likely to increase your calorie intake, especially in the form of snacks. If you think about the kind of foods you may choose when you are tired you can understand how this might lead to weight gain. High calorie/low nutrient fast foods exist for convenience and I can't think of anyone more interested in convenience than a sleep deprived person. It's hard to find the motivation to put together a helthful meal when you simply don't have the energy. It also becomes much harder to become or stay active if you're tired. It is well worth figuring out what you need in order to get more sleep as getting enough sets you up for better food choices, better digestion, and better health.
